6-Month Preliminary Evaluation Report

- October 2011 – March 2012
- 536 Post Release Community Supervision
- 56.7% high-risk for committing violent offense
- Bench Warrant numbers were over double the Statewide average
- Violence plaguing our Community

Protect Public Safety and Reduce Recidivism

High Violent Offender Court

- Selection Process
 - STRONG Risk Assessment
 - 98% high risk for committing a violent offense
 - Noncompliance issues under supervision
 - Assessed by Case Manager for suitability

Develop Individual Offender Plan

- Collaborative Effort
- Identify Stressors and Obligations
- Identify Criminogenic Needs/Protective factors

Develop Individual Offender Plan

- Refer to Programs/Services
 - Court Ordered Programs
 - Substance Abuse (residential/out patient)
 - Mental Health (counseling/medication checks)
 - Education
 - Job Training
 - Cognitive Behavioral Interventions
 - One-on-One Counseling with Case Manager
 - CCP Task Force

Court Hearings

- Team Meetings Prior to Court
- Review Progress and/or Problems
- Incentives/Sanctions
- Modification of Program
- New Referrals
- Set Next Hearing Date

CCP Task Force

- CCP Funding - \$639,292
 - 1 Sergeant (Stockton PD)
 - 3 Police Officer (Lodi/Manteca/Tracy PD)
 - 1 Probation Officer*
 - Vehicles/Equipment/Overtime
- Prop. 30/CPCA Funding - \$612,874
 - 1 Police Officer (Stockton PD)
 - 1 Deputy Sheriff (Lathrop/SJC)
 - 1 Crime Analyst (Stockton PD)
 - Training
 - Reserve Fund

Results

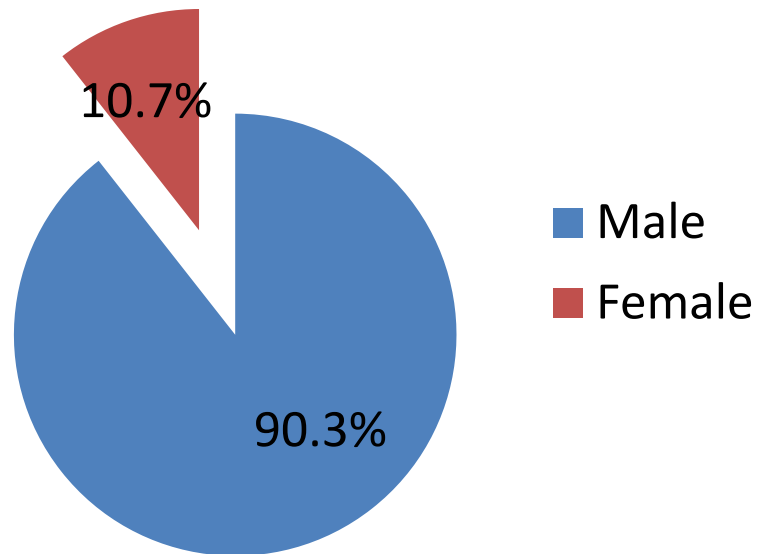
January – September 2013

- 203 Compliance Checks
- 62 Arrests
 - 40 for Violations/Bench Warrants
 - 22 for New Charges
- 74 Referrals to Service Providers/Programs
- 59 Offender Associates Identified

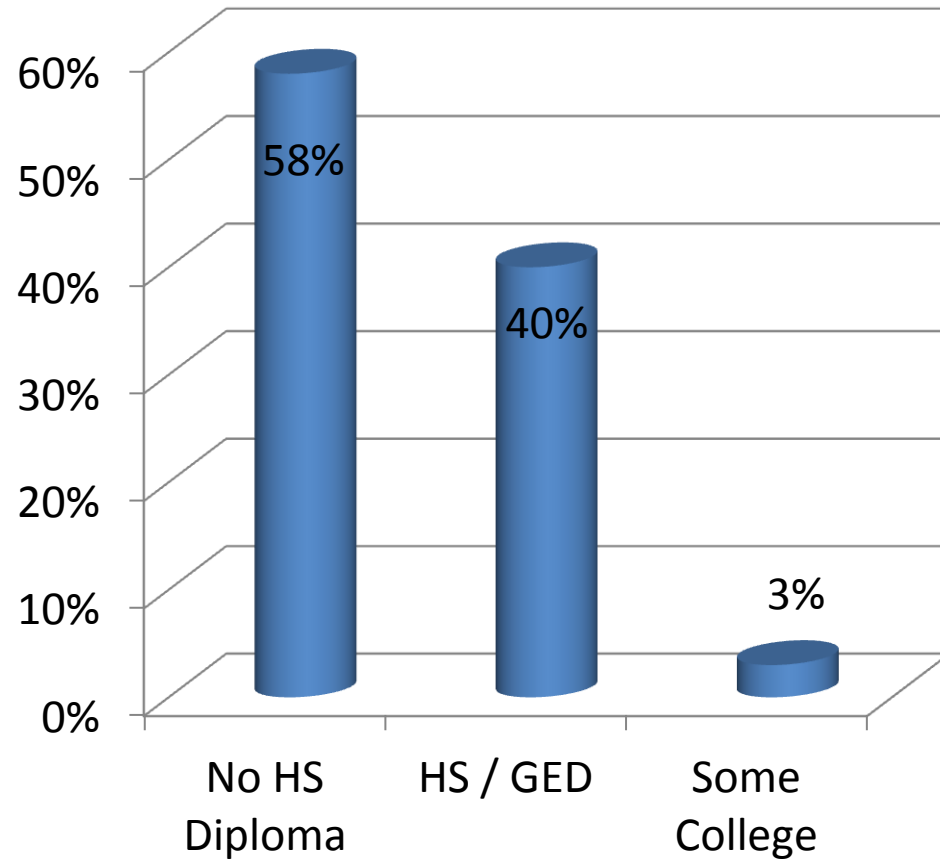


High Violent Offender Court Demographics

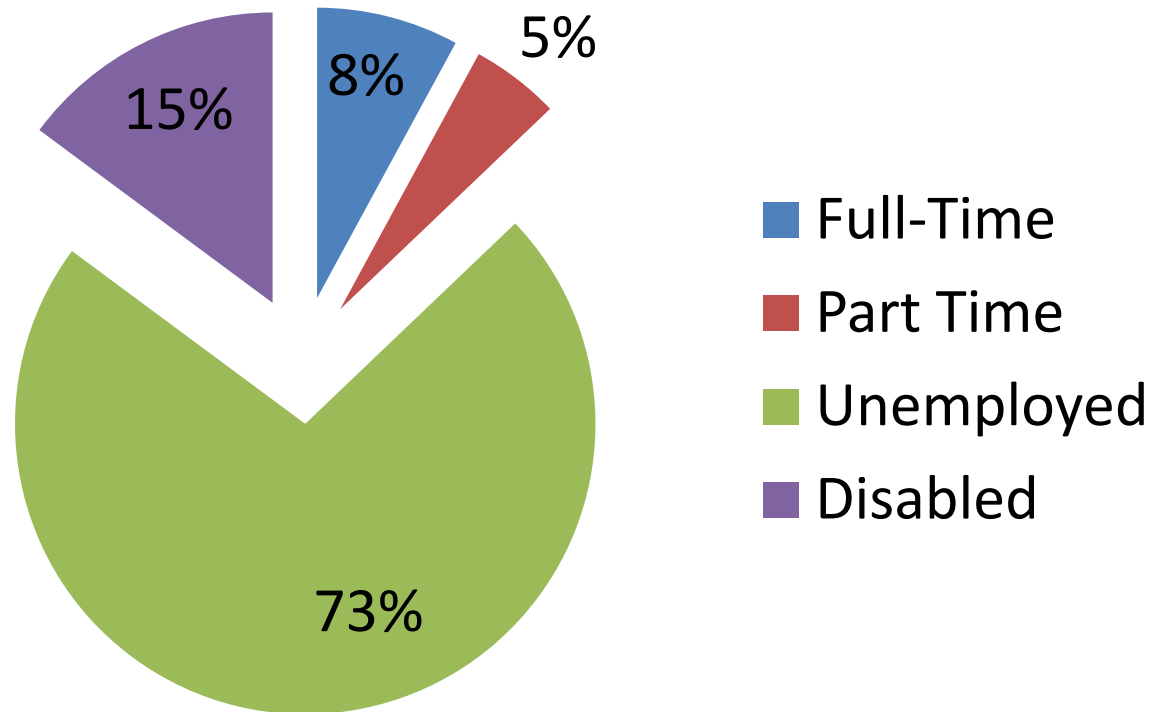
- 40 clients since January 2013

High Violent Offender Court Client Diagnosed Disorders

- 90% have substance abuse issues
- 43% have mental health issues
- 97.5% were referred to a treatment program

Revocations	2	5%
New Arrests	8	20%
Convictions	1	2.5%
