Whittier Street Health Center was the scene of CRJ's second annual job fair. Twenty-two local employers and vocational training partners greeted the more than 100 job seekers who attended this year's event. Participants included residents of all of CRJ's Social Justice Services programs and partner agencies. Employment is an important stabilizing factor and a major focus of CRJ's work with our clients. Eighty-six percent of our residents successfully complete our programs with a job.

Social Justice Services

Through our network of program locations, we assist in the successful transition of men and women who have been incarcerated back to their communities by providing support services, counseling, education, and training. Successfully reuniting these men and women with their families, securing gainful employment and stable housing combined with the effective use of support systems, significantly reduces the risk of re-offending. This leads to better outcomes and safer communities.


Our residential program for youth – Sargent House – works with young men with very challenging behaviors due to trauma, cognitive disabilities or intellectual challenges. Building on their individual strengths, we set out to maximize motivation, participation, and progress. Self-esteem and self-control are developed, with the ultimate goal of successful independence.



Eight proud gentleman recently celebrated their graduation from CRJ's **Overcoming the Odds** program. OTO is a Boston-based initiative that provides intensive case management to a group of men currently incarcerated through the Department of Corrections and judged to be at a high risk to re-offend. Reducing recidivism is the goal of this program funded through a grant from the federal Second Chance Act. Our work starts prior to their release from incarceration and helps to insure a successful return to Boston's urban neighborhoods.


SJS Direct Service Program Locations

States Where the Crime and Justice Institute Has Conducted Business



JUSTICE INITIATIVES FOR 2016

Police oversight and collaborative reform with the community – improving accountability structures and supporting police and communities to work together to reduce fear and crime without compromising civil liberties or individual harm.

Solitary confinement in prison – coaching prison officials and staff to reduce their reliance on segregation for punishment, increase the safety of prison staff and inmates, and prepare offenders for a return to population and society.

Pretrial detention and services – addressing the overuse of pretrial detention to minimize harm, reduce costs, and the imposition of longer, unnecessary incarceration.


Community Strategies

Adults with Developmental/Intellectual Disabilities are empowered to enjoy rich and rewarding lives through our more than 30 residential and day programs which offer community engagement, meaningful employment, and personal development.

CRJ continues to grow our impact by increasing our capacity to provide Shared Living options for people who are ready to move to a more individualized support model. We look to match a person with developmental disabilities with a Shared Living Home Provider who has the talents and resources to provide care in a more home-like setting than a group home model. We continue to recruit more Home Providers who are compassionate caregivers, who will welcome these women and men into their lives. CRJ staff provides the training, case management services and other supports needed to insure success.
